**Materials and Techniques** Chavn artists skillfully employed stone carving particularly using volcanic rock to create monumental sculptures intricately decorated ceramics and massive architectural complexes Their mastery of relief carving and the use of varied textures added depth and visual interest to their works The use of hammered and polished metals like gold and copper was also emerging during this period although less prevalent than stonework Chavn art wasn't solely decorative it was intimately tied to religious practices and served to reinforce the power and influence of the elite The most renowned example of Chavn artistry is the Lanzón a monolithic stone carving of a deity at the Chavn de Hunter site Its imposing presence and intricate detail undoubtedly instilled awe and reverence in its observers This period also saw the development of sophisticated weaving techniques laying groundwork for the later textile excellence of Andean cultures
